The Quadrangle Dormitories – “The Quads” – would be celebrating 50+ years had they and Parsons survived...



Pictured above are the Quadrangle Dormitories, affectionately know as the “Quads” during their peak years of existence. The design was an eccentric architect’s dream come true and certainly on the cutting edge of innovative college student housing.

At first glance, this photo might lead one to suspect that Parsons College was invaded by a fleet of flying saucers from outer space. But you may dismiss that thought. The Quadrangle dormitories were just another of the many innovations inspired and contrived by the master of the Parsons Plan – **Dr. Millard G. Roberts**.

The “Quads” were first built on the north side of campus, adjacent to Lake Louise. The mandatory relocation of five fraternities from off-campus houses to the “Quads” in 1963 resulted in filling them to capacity. Not long after, a trio of sororities were transfer red to another set of “Quads” on the south side of Lake Louise. The movement to Quadrangle housing was then in full swing.

The “Quads” were built in sets of three separate, but clustered units. Unit #1 housed a family/game room, housemother quarters and (initially) individual private rooms branching off an open entry area. Unit #2 served as private rooms and sleeping quarters on the upper level

and as the breakfast/lunch/dinner dining room on the lower. And Unit #3 was 100% private rooms on the upper and lower levels. Each room was supplied with air conditioning, desk, sink, closet and bed. And each organization was given an allowance of \$20,000 to furnish their units.

As enrollment increased, the college was forced to add bunk beds to double the occupancy. Except for the Greek/Social Club name and signing, the “Quads” all looked very much the same. The “Quads” later served as dormitories to all students and were turned into apartments for students during the early Maharishi years. The “Quads” as E-News understands, were build to last 20-30 years. They served their purpose well and, like most of the original Parsons campus buildings, they, too, eventually met the wrecking ball and have been torn down...

“The Pride of Parsons”

Where Are They Now?? - 1970 Basketball "Wildkittens"

The year was 1970 and Parsons College was at a cross roads. The school had been in an enrollment decline since 1967 and there was an "opportunity of a lifetime" about ready to be placed on the doorstep to Parsons Hall by an alum by the name of **Bob Spencer '57**.

Women's intercollegiate athletics at the start of the 1970's was far and few between. Most women played basketball with sponsors such as LOOK Magazine, Des Moines, Iowa and Real Refrigeration, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. One school in Nebraska, was providing a basketball program for their women students and offering scholarships to attract top prospects to the small community in southeast

Nebraska. Communication began between **Coach Bob Spencer** and **Dr. John Wahrer**, Athletic Director at Parsons College and the possibility became a reality as a majority of the women's athletes from John F. Kennedy College were invited to enroll at Parsons and receive athletic scholarships for their participation in basketball, softball and track and field. At the same time, Midwestern College in Denison, Iowa was under severe financial stress and the doors of the college were ready to close. Midwestern also had a women's athletic program. The perfect storm came to be, and in the fall of 1970 the Parsons College campus was awash with women athletes arriving from around Iowa, the midwest and beyond.

The first season tipped-off in December of 1970 with the "Wildkittens" running up a 5-0 record by the end of the month. The local fans were wild about coming to Fry-Thomas Fieldhouse. They filled the stands to watch the "Wildkittens" warm-up to the strains of "Sweet Georgia Brown". The ball handling drills and juggling were some of the warm-up routines used to dazzle the home crowd and jiggle the opponents confidence. According to the Ottumwa Courier in March of 1971, Parsons home crowd attendance would consistently be in excess of 2,000.

On March 21, 1972, the Amarillo Daily News reported that the Parsons College "Wildkittens" were ranked # 4 nationally heading into the prestigious AAU National Basketball Tournament, hosted in Council Bluffs, Iowa. According to the Sioux City Journal, the Parsons team finished fourth in the AAU National Tournament, behind the first place Wayland Flying Queens, second place Raytown Piperettes of Missouri, and third place Ouachita College of Arkansas. Tournament favorites were selected as All-Americans, **Lois Stuflick** and **Ellen Mosher** of Parsons were honored for their play during the tournament.

What an exciting first season for the Parsons "Wildkitten" women's basketball team. Parsons women's basketball continued for two more years of quality intercollegiate and AAU basketball.

The legacy lives on today in the Division I College ranks in Iowa. Coach Spencer moved his basketball program to William Penn College in Oskaloosa, Iowa, when Parsons College closed its doors on June 3, 1973. The William Penn Statesmen continued to play at a high level of competition with Coach Spencer at the helm, and on this particular occasion found themselves playing St. Ambrose College in Davenport, Iowa. The Penn team soundly defeated St. Ambrose.

The next week, Coach Spencer received a letter from the young St. Ambrose student-coach congratulating him on a fine road victory. The student-coach told of his admiration for the Penn Women's program and would be willing to transfer to Penn for his sophomore year if he would be able to work with Coach Spencer and the basketball program.

That sophomore transfer took place, and **Bill Fennelly** became the student assistant coach for the Penn team. Bill is now the coach of the nationally ranked Iowa State University women's basketball team. The nationally ranked University of Iowa Hawkeye women's basketball team coach, **Lisa Bluder**, was a student athlete at Linn Mar High School (Cedar Rapids, Iowa) and was coached by former "Wildkitten", **Susie Kudrna**.

Where are the "Wildkittens" now?

Dr. Linda Bane Frizzell, PhD - Taught at a number of universities including North Dakota State. Believed to be living in LaPorte, MN. Technical advisor for the National Medicare & Medicaid Policy Committee, Portland, Oregon. Area of expertise includes, American Indian Public Health.

Joyce Berlin Witzenburg coached basketball and softball while teaching high school math for 35 years. She was the second woman head coach in the state of Iowa to reach 200 career wins. In softball, her Fairfield High School team finished in the top five three years in a row.

Colleen Bowser currently lives in Kansas. She went on to play in the 1971 Pan Am Games in Cali, Columbia with **Ellen Mosher**. Colleen married a professional football player.

Donna Fenske Nixon was inducted into the Girl's HS Hall of Fame in 2013. Currently lives in Portland, Oregon area.

Karen Gerard coached track & field and taught physical education in Webster City. She is currently retired and living in Sigourney, Iowa.

Sally Havens Corcoran was Assistant to the Drake Relays Director. Moved to the West Coast and has since moved back to Des Moines. She coached volleyball at Greenfield before working at Drake University (2000 to 2009).

Karen Hoesel – Married Larry Moore and moved back to Texas to complete her education.

Jan Irby – Transferred to William Penn College and played basketball for Coach Spencer and then coached in the state of Texas for a number of years. School locations are unavailable.

Cathy Jensen – Cathy taught all levels of Physical Education, as well as coaching basketball and track & field in the Bondurant-Farrar School District in Iowa. Cathy was "Willie the Wildcat" during her years at Parsons.

Sandy Konrad McCullough lives in Indianola, IA. She was a HS counselor in Indianola. Sandy served as an assistant basketball coach at Pleasantville High School, Iowa. As a fall softball coach, she took her team to the state tournament in 1984.

Susie Kuderna, Upon graduation she moved into the teaching and coaching field in Marion, Iowa. One of her young players on the Linn Mar basketball team was **Lisa Bluder**, currently the head coach for the University of Iowa women Hawkeyes basketball team.

Ellen Mosher Hanson currently owns a resort in Wisconsin. Ellen was a 7-time AAU All-American and played on the USA team for 5-years, including the World Tournament. She was the head coach at UCLA (1972-74) and coached Ann Meyers, one of the nation's top players. Ellen later became head coach at the University of Minnesota where she now resides.

Marilyn Smith was an assistant coach at Washington, IA high school 1973-75.

Lois Stuflick Johnson was an Instructor of Physical Education & Health for 34 years at South East Polk School District in Des Moines. Also assistant track & field coach and assistant basketball coach at SE Polk where they were Girl's State Basketball Tournament Champions in 1977. Lois is a five time AAU All-American and played in the Pan Am Games 1971. She was inducted into the Iowa Girl's High School Hall of Fame in 1974.

Cindy Thompson Albers is living in Decorah, Iowa. Cindy is still coaching basketball at Decorah High School. Her children competed in sports at Luther College and played against **Sandy Konrad's** children who played at Central College.

Sandy Van Cleave lives in Montezuma, IA and competed in basketball at the 1971 Pan Am games with **Lois Stuflick**, in Cali Columbia. She later went to the Olympics in rifle shooting. Sandy was inducted to the Iowa Hall of Pride, representing the 6-on-6 player basketball in Des Moines.

Kris Westphal was Athletic Director at Iowa City's West High School. Kris would perform ball handling drills with **Marilyn Smith** and had a booth at the Iowa State Fair showing off their juggling and ball handling skills.

Jean Wick and husband **Tom Lappe** live the Winfield, IA area. Daughter, **Linda Lappe**, is head coach of the University of Colorado Buffalos in Boulder. **Jill Wick** married a farmer and is living in NW Iowa.

Jeannie Weiffenbach became an Attorney-at-Law. No further information is available.



The continuing saga of success in women's intercollegiate basketball repeatedly winds its way back to Parsons College from the period of 1970-1973. That's when **Coach Bob Spencer** (currently of Des Moines) and his student assistant coach **Ray Ham** (currently of Fairfield) arrived just before the start of the fall semester. They made ad difference and women's basketball in Iowa, the midwest, and the country would never be the same.

Remember When... by Doug Marion '70

Parsons College 1965-1970. I enrolled from 1962-1965, then took a three year break and returned in mid-1968. The enrollment in mid-1965 was around 4,400. As most know, the college peaked at 5,500 students in 1966, but the grossly yellow journalistic (my professional opinion) story in *LIFE* Magazine, June, 1966, titled, "*The Wizard of Flunkout U*," sadly ignited the unfortunate and demise of Parsons. When its accreditation was later revoked, over one-half the student body transferred. But many, like myself, were intent and lucky to return. I was determined to earn my BA degree. After receiving a letter of re-admission from the Director of Admissions, **Charles Barnett**, I returned in June of 1968.

Back in the summer of 1963, through 1964 and forward, a major building expansion campaign was launched. This included a new library, student union followed by a number of on-campus "Quadrangular", two-story student housing facilities, referred to as "The Quads." Each complex included three clustered, but separate dormitory buildings. Building #1 had a rectangular lounge in the upstairs center area along with dorm rooms and a first class kitchen and dining facility on the lower level.

Building #2 had the same upstairs features and a family/game room of sorts on the lower floor. And building #3 housed dorm rooms on both upper and lower levels. Soon, they were filled with sororities, fraternities, athletes and non-affiliated students. But in 1968, Parsons was still without accreditation and enrollment had dropped to 1,500 students. Sadly, that drop in student enrollment caused many of the quads to become vacant. However, to maintain insurance (a must with PC Creditors), each vacant quad had to have a live-in "caretaker". My wife and I were offered residence and caretaker duties for Quad #153. Our monthly rent was \$25. (Yes, twenty-five dollars). This Quad also served as a storage facility for Ex-President, Dr. Roberts' lavish furniture and décor. During this period, Parsons' new President, **Dr. Carl Kreisler**, his executive staff (including Dean of the College, **Dr. Robert Tree**) and Board of Trustees, worked feverishly to regain academic accreditation. The student body continued to attend classes daily, fully assuming this would happen – and it did in 1969. But by then the damage was done, enrollment dropped and was hovering at 1,000. In 1970, it increased to 1,500, but that wasn't enough to cover the financial obligations and the creditors demands. In less than three years, Parsons sadly closed (June, 1973). Collateral was called in, which included volumes of books from the library, and the property was vacated. After laying dormant for a year, the current owners were said to have paid around \$1,000,000 for the land, buildings and property, a sizeable amount in the early 1970's. Looking back in retrospect, I, along with many of my fellow alumni have wondered: "What if WE had gone after it? Could the student body, faculty and alumni have raised that amount of money back then to save the college? Had we only known. Interestingly, *LIFE* Magazine, has met its demise and has also shuttered its doors...

"The Mansion" was built in 1857 by Fairfield's first congressman, Bernard Henn, and served as the home of Parsons early presidents. It was renamed Ewing hall in 1912.

60 Years ago...Parsons featured an “All-Iowa” team

Even in the 1950's not many Iowa Colleges/Universities could boast having an “All-Iowa” team. But coach **O.B. Nelson's** squad of 1954-1955 had 14 players, all of whom hailed from Iowa. The Wildcats finished third in the Iowa Conference with a 14-9 season-ending record. However, in addition to being a “home state” squad, the team posted several other marks of distinction. First of all, they averaged 85 points per game (second best in the state) – and broke the 100 century mark four times – the 109 points scored in the victory over Upper Iowa may have endured as the most ever for a Wildcats team – and ALL BEFORE the inclusion of the 3-point score. **Charlie Merritt** was the big man and **Ron Kester** bolstered the attack with his 2nd semester return. **Roger Nielsen, John Smith** and **Stu Steiner** were the team's leading scorers with **Rod Smith** and **Lee Kane** rounding out the starting five. R. Smith had the blazing speed - Kane launched many long, left-handed sets from backcourt - Nielsen was the ball hawk - and Steiner the floor general... Interestingly, of the 14 members on that team, four (**Fred Bankus, George Long Nielsen** and **Kane**) went on to compete in the Iowa State Senior Olympic Games and won a number of medals. In 2011, Kane was named to the Senior Olympics Hall of Fame. And three squad members (Nielsen, Long and Kane) were recently honored with induction to the Parsons College Student/Alumni Wall of Honor. This memorable squad had many common denominators, both athletically and with their lifetime accomplishments. Happy 60th anniversary to a very distinguished bunch!!! *(Editor's note: The information included in this story was provided by Lee Kane, PC'55)*

A Drive Through Memory Lane... with Dr. Bob Tree

The reference to Howard Dorm in one of the Winter E-News write-in's reminded me of a little anecdote involving the 3rd addition to that dormitory building, and the late **Mr. Hubert E. Howard**, a long time trustee of Parsons College.

Howard Dorm #1 had been built at the north end of the property with an attractive lounge extended east toward Highway 1 with the dorm rooms extending south, parallel to the Highway.

It had been in use a full year when I arrived to join the faculty in September of 1955. Howard Dorm #2 was added to #1 a year or so after. The college continued to grow and a third addition was needed. At the ground breaking ceremony for Howard Dorm #3, as Mr. Howard put his foot down on the shovel to break ground, he commented that he had "not anticipated establishing a dynasty of dormitories with the first one."

I understand Mr. Howard, who was an industrialist joined the board in 1942, contributed generously to the original addition, and each thereafter, and it took one last addition (Howard Dorm #4) to complete the building as it stands today. But prior to finishing the project at the corner of 4th and Carpenter Streets, the old Alpha Kappa (AK) house, which later housed the Tau Kappa Epsilon and Phi Sigma Epsilon fraternities, had to be torn down. That old house saw a lot of usage. In fact, I had a room on the second floor my first year at Parsons and enjoyed living there. When I learned that I would be returning a second year, I began looking for an apartment. I found a great one, brand new, over **Lou and Refa Gaines** three-car garage, a block south of the square on South Court Street and lived there for 30 years, or so. I suspect that had that old house not belonged to the College, it would have been condemned many years before. It was truly a survivor. Mr. Howard, then a prominent Fairfield resident and Treasurer of the Board, later moved to Northbrook, Illinois, where he passed away in 1976. He was 87-years-old...


