## All-Classes Reunion, 10<sup>th</sup> Wall Of Honor Ceremony Scheduled The Weekend Of October 5-7, 2018...

Once again, the Parsons College Foundation Fund (PCFF) and the Parsons College Alumni Association (PCAA) have joined forces and are planning an All-Class Reunion to be held in conjunction with the 10<sup>th</sup> Wall of Honor Ceremony and the presentation of the 'Parsons College Wildcats Spirit Awards', October 5-7, 2018.

Ten years ago in October of 2008, Wall of Honor Co-Founder **John Blackstock** announced that he and Co-Founder **Dave Neff** were prepared to launch a 10-year program to recognize, honor and bring back 100 Parsons Students/Alumni who had distinguished themselves in their career fields, their community, and by giving back to Parsons College.

The first WOH class was inducted in 2009. The year 2018 marks the 10<sup>th</sup> and final year of the program.. 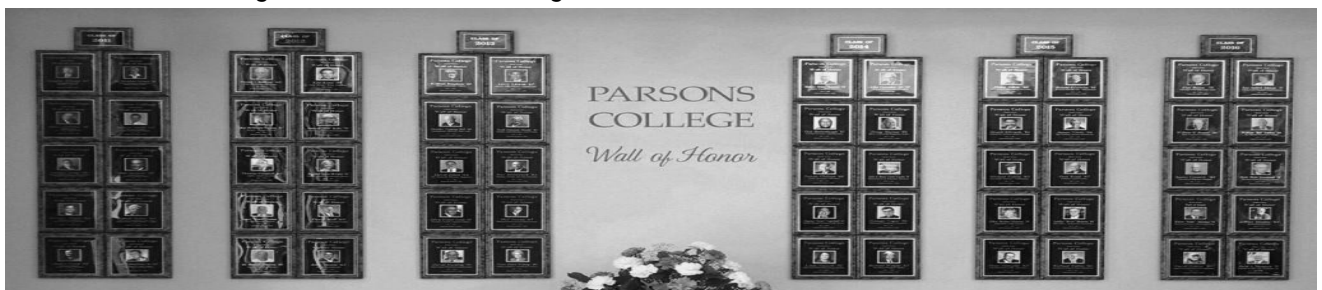

*Parsons Medical University????*

Nearly 40 years ago, while employed by Key Bank in Albany, NY, I mustered the courage to call one of our former Parsons College trustees who had bitterly resigned from the board upon **Millard G. Roberts** termination.

Reluctantly, I asked him, as a Parsons College graduate, if he would consider having lunch with me. To my surprise, actually to my shock, he accepted. **Clyde W. Wright**, a resident of Oneonta, NY who was well into his eighties arrived in a chauffeured car, and our lunch meeting began. As you may recall, Mr. Wright was the benefactor of our new library building and it was named for him. Roberts and Wright were personal friends, and lived in Oneonta for years prior to Roberts arrival at Parsons. Wright was one of the early founders of IBM, who significantly benefited from the company's early success, and massed a fortune. Roberts knew he had the perfect man to help him create his vision for Parsons College, and quickly appointed him to the board.

Not knowing what to expect, I was pleasantly surprised to be warmly greeted, and to discover a somewhat frail man with a firm handshake, and a mild, but somewhat formal demeanor. It became evident through our conversation his love for Parsons College, and his undeniable respect and admiration for Roberts. Many times during our conversation he emphatically expressed his deep disappointment for Robert's demise. It was also evident that their friendship endured in spite of the many allegations that precipitated the board's decision to terminate Roberts. Repeatedly, he told me Robert's firing was a travesty that precipitated the closure of the college. His reverence for Roberts became more and more apparent as our one discussion went on. This was a man who was loyal to Roberts, right to the end.

But what really surprised me, clearly an understatement, was his announcement that he had purchased property for Roberts in Oneonta to facilitate Robert's plan for what one day, would be, *Parsons Medical University*. He sadly lamented that Robert's firing quickly destroyed any such plans. Incidentally, that very property in part, became the home of the National Soccer Hall of Fame.

*Footnote:* Key Bank, formerly National Commercial Bank & Trust Company's President and CEO, **Walter Herzog**, was a personal friend of Roberts and was also an early appointment to the Parsons board of trustees.

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*“Pro-Active” Admissions Department*

Some of you know Parsons maintained recruiting offices in Chicago and NYC. What you probably didn't know is that Parsons had an admissions staff larger than most major colleges and universities. At one time it had as many as 19 recruiters in the field, compared to perhaps four or five that another institution of similar size might have employed. Obviously, Roberts realized that to increase enrollment he had to be "pro-active" and to his credit, he initiated and promoted the concept to what some educators claimed was extreme. Extreme or not, the "proof was in the pudding", Parsons enrollment grew at a breathtaking pace.

*Foot note:* **Richard N. Hoerner**, chairman of the board of trustees in the early years of Robert's administration was probably most influential in helping Roberts realize the value of initiating a program that incorporated "pro-active recruiting", much out of character for Roberts ... he listened!

### One Remarkable Faculty

Amazingly, as enrollment increased from the fall of 1955 to the fall of 1965, PhD's increased from 6 to 93...M.A.'s from 16 to 98...and B.A.'s on staff from 9 to 59. A sum total of 31 in 1955 to a remarkable sum total of 255 by 1965, in just 10 short years! Unfortunately, the faculty turnover rate at Parsons was far higher than most institutions. "We should have a revolving door," said one administrator, "to facilitate the simultaneous exit and arrival of new faculty members." A few months before Roberts was fired, only thirteen ranked faculty members had been at the college as long as five years! Robert's "modus operandi" was as if to say, if I don't like you, or you don't like me, you can pack your bags, I have potential candidates waiting in line, I have, after all, the third highest paid faculty in the United States.

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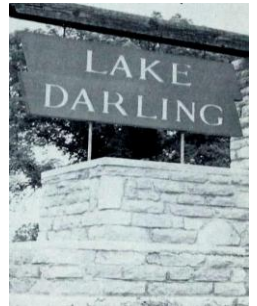

## ***“The Final Days of Parsons College”***

The final graduation of Parsons College was just completed and the scramble began with Student/Athletes finding a landing spot for the fall of 1973 to continue their education. This chapter tells the story of the Women’s Athletic Department making a transition from Parsons to William Penn College in Oskaloosa, Iowa.

**Bob and Pat Spencer** along with the assistance of **Ray Ham** made a mad scramble to afford this smooth transition of the Parsons College Wildkitten program to a new home. They shared this interview on April 6, 2018.

### ***Background***

The Parsons College Women’s Athletic program including basketball, cross country, track and field and softball had arrived the fall of 1970 from John F. Kennedy College in Wahoo, Nebraska. The basketball program was the crown jewel of the transition. A successful program had been implemented and nurtured at JFK.

At that time JFK was one of only a few colleges in the country sponsoring a women’s basketball program. All of their competition was made up of AAU women’s basketball teams from Wisconsin, Nebraska, Iowa and Missouri. This was all before Title IX was implemented by the NCAA. Long drives were made to provide playing opportunities for these student/athletes.

The Iowa Girl’s State Basketball Tournament was held at Veterans Auditorium in Des Moines, Iowa every March. All of the schools in Iowa were in one class, so the small schools many times would take on the large Des Moines Schools and come out the victor.

The State Tournament was held at the Veterans Auditorium and would be sold out for the final four competition. Many of these Iowa girls were looking to continue their education and to play basketball on the college level and when Coach Bob Spencer implemented one of the first summer high school girls’ basketball camps in the Midwest at John F. Kennedy College in Wahoo, Nebraska, the camp openings would fill up quickly.

John F. Kennedy College was having financial difficulties resulting in Parsons Athletic Director, **Dr. John Wahrer**, making an offer to Coach Spencer to bring a women’s athletic program to Fairfield in the fall of 1970. **Ted Dillow**, President of John F Kennedy College in Wahoo, NE, a former Parsons faculty member, wanted the girls to stay in Iowa and he assisted as best he could in the transition.

Spencer and Wahrer, both being Parsons Alums, felt this would be a great opportunity for Parsons College. At the same time, one of the Parsons Satellite schools, Midwestern College in Denison, Iowa was ready to close and they also had a women’s basketball program. The admissions department at Parsons College was able to recruit most of the student body from Midwestern College including their student athletes. As a result those women basketball players from JFK and Midwestern comprised the first Parsons College women’s basketball program in Fairfield, Iowa. Fry-Thomas Fieldhouse on campus would be filled to the rafters with college and town fans for each of the home games with the Parsons College Wildkitten basketball team.

## **Parsons Final Year**

A William Penn representative had made overtures to Coach Spencer in 1972, with a door opening opportunity for the women's athletic program. Coach Spencer, along with so many of the faculty and staff, were not ready to accept that the college could be closing. So Spencer thanked the representative and kept focusing on the current student/athletes.

The contacts in Oskaloosa came from Spencer's background from coaching and teaching at Carlisle, Iowa. **Ron Randleman** the Athletic Director and Head Football Coach at William Penn had been a student/athlete at Carlisle when he was in high school and had Spencer as a teacher and coach. Spencer was the assistant football coach and loved this job. He transitioned from football to coaching track in the spring and Randleman, along with 88 of the 111 high school boys, came out for track. His mantra was "be on time for practice."

**Lake Crookham** was a graduate of Parsons College and was actively involved in the Oskaloosa Community as an attorney. He was assisting William Penn in this opportunity of transition in locating various places for activity such as the basketball camp and arranging a swimming pool for the summer basketball camp participants.

**Pete Kendall** as director of the admissions department at William Penn College also saw this as a great recruiting tool and wanted the women's athletic program to make a smooth transition from Fairfield to Oskaloosa. Therefore the three interested parties were the primary contacts for Coach Spencer and the women's athletic program was able to make a smooth transition over the weekend from a closing Parsons College campus to an inviting William Penn campus in Oskaloosa.

There were other Iowa colleges who were interested in obtaining the transferring of the student/athletes including, Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. But he strong ties with the leaders of William Penn College won the choice of the Parsons College Women's Athletic Department.

The first week of the Parsons College 1973 high school girl's basketball camp was completed on June 1<sup>st</sup> in Fairfield. The remaining 10 weeks of camp were scheduled and ready to arrive in Oskaloosa each Sunday afternoon.

## **Implementation**

The announcement of the closure of Parsons College came on a Friday morning to the college community from **Dr. Everett Hadley**, acting president. The plan was formed with the leadership of Coach Bob Spencer, his wife Pat and assistant basketball coach, Ray Ham. Spencer made the phone call to William Penn College that he was ready to accept their offer and the migration from Fairfield to Oskaloosa began in earnest.

Pat Spencer began placing phone calls to the girls who were registered for the second week of camp scheduled to begin that Sunday afternoon June 3, 1973. There were 110 registrations for that next week and all but one accepted the opportunity to go to the William Penn campus for camp. The commitment was overwhelming.

There was a great buzz in Oskaloosa as the word arrived of the acceptance of their offer. The William Penn graduation was taking place on that Saturday, June 2, 1973, and the basketball camp would be arriving Sunday afternoon. Many of the faculty and staff sprang into action cleaning the dorm rooms and placing fresh linen in place for the Sunday afternoon arrival of the basketball camp girls.

The rest is history as the ten weeks of camp were a success and a good number of the Parsons College student/athletes became William Penn student/athletes.

## Epilogue –

Coach Spencer shared the following reflection at the end of the interview. The women's athletic program did not plan to leave Parsons. Coach's feelings were that had Parsons remained open he would have stayed in Fairfield until retiring. Spencer's love for the college and the city was based on experiences as a student, alumni and Parsons faculty member.

His personal sentiments toward Dr. Roberts work ethic was over the top. Spencer further stated that the criticism toward Dr. Roberts was based on his being a man before his time in education. "Higher Education" had not seen practices on the college level that Dr. Roberts had put in place. Side note: Coach Spencer was the private driver for Dr Roberts after being discharged from the service...

# Gene Copeland '61: Parsons Loses A Tremendous Friend And Supporter

*Eugene "Gene" Leroy Copeland* of Fairfield, passed away June 9, 2018, at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics. He was 79. A true, humble human being, thankful, grateful for anything anyone ever did for him. Gene was born in Fairfield and had an immense impact on perpetuity in donations on display at the Carnegie Historical Museum and the Fairfield Art Association. Other philanthropic donations were made to Denver General Hospital, The Copeland Collection of the Auraria Library, and even the Fairfield Library. His entire life was given in service.

Graduated Fairfield High School 1957, with honors; Parsons College, 1961 with honors; and University of Iowa College of Law, 1965 with a Juris Doctor with Distinction. A Fulbright scholar, member of Phi Kappa Phi, Tau Kappa Epsilon, and Who's Who in America, Gene played trombone in the high school band, sang in the choir, participated in intercollegiate debate and wrote for the college newspaper. He served for seven years in the Iowa National Guard and played the baritone in the 34th Infantry Division Band. Gene was on the Board of Editors, Iowa Law Review from 1964-1965. He was admitted to the Colorado and Iowa bars in 1965, and the Supreme Court of the United States Court bar in 1966.

Gene went to Denver and opened his own practice from 1965-1966. In 1966 he was elected Senior Vice President and General Counsel of Security Life of Denver. In 1986 he was elected Chief Counsel of what became the largest insurance corporation in the world, ING. Gene was a lecturer, speaker at legal and industry conventions, seminars and meetings. A prolific writer, he authored numerous legal publications even to include Law Review on Iowa water pollution laws. Throughout Gene's life he served on numerous boards and committees, including: ING, the 7th largest company in the world, as General Counsel. Let us never overlook his constant press to improve education.

"**Gene Copeland Day**" was declared March 1, 2000, by **Denver Mayor Wellington Webb**, which included a parade and keys to the city. Some of Gene's interests were fine arts, cross-country skiing, classical music, visiting the sick and elderly at various facilities, and traveling around the world. Left to share Gene's memories are many cousins and many good friends in Fairfield, Colorado, and all over the world. He also leaves behind his beloved cats, Fred and Mika.

To say Gene was an accomplished human being is quite the understatement, and now he goes to his eternal reward to hear, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant." Amen.

Funeral service was June 16, 2018, at First United Methodist Church. Burial with Military Honors was held at Evergreen Cemetery...

# My Last Day At Parsons College! *by Nancy Schwartz Wirtanen*

The students and faculty were called together on Friday June 1<sup>st</sup>, 1973 in Brown Learning Center. The acting President **Everett Hadley** announced that the college will be closing their doors after the last commencement exercise on Saturday June 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1973. Many students were unable to find seats and listened in stunned silence. A few sobbed and others, including some long time faculty members held back tears.

The saddest sight on campus was in front of Barhydt Chapel. The old green & white colors flying at half-mast in mourning. There were all kinds of media as well as recruiters on campus trying to recruit students. At the time they were the last people you wanted to talk with. It was a very somber mood.

**Cathy Killian Levine** and I, along with some other classmates, attended the bankruptcy hearing in Des Moines. The student body tried raising enough money to keep the school open. By collecting change and holding car washes. We were so close but no cigar. The court wouldn't give us an extension.

As I recall, we had 24 hours to get off campus because the electricity and phone service had been turned off. You had to scramble to get packed and find a way to have your things shipped. I had checked around and found that Trailways would be the cheapest way to ship my things back east. I had a friend take it all to the Trailways station and had my things shipped. My parents drove me out the very first time and since then, I never had all my things back home.

I was devastated by the news that Parsons was closing its doors. It had to be the worst day of my life. What was I going to do? I had one year left. I thought about going to the University of Iowa, but at the last minute I decided that was way too big of a school. It wasn't until the Epperson's came east recruiting for Simpson College, that I decided I would finish there. Simpson was a Methodist school just south of Des Moines. They didn't welcome us with open arms. They would say, "Are you one of them?" It was hard fitting in.

This is why I want to see the spirit of Parsons stay alive. "We're the little school that refuses to die".

## *A Severe Blow To Fairfield...*

### **'Insurmountable Odds' Close The Doors of Parsons College Forever**

## “THE PARSONS STUDENT ENTRANCE PLEDGE”, CIRCA 1875 - 1907

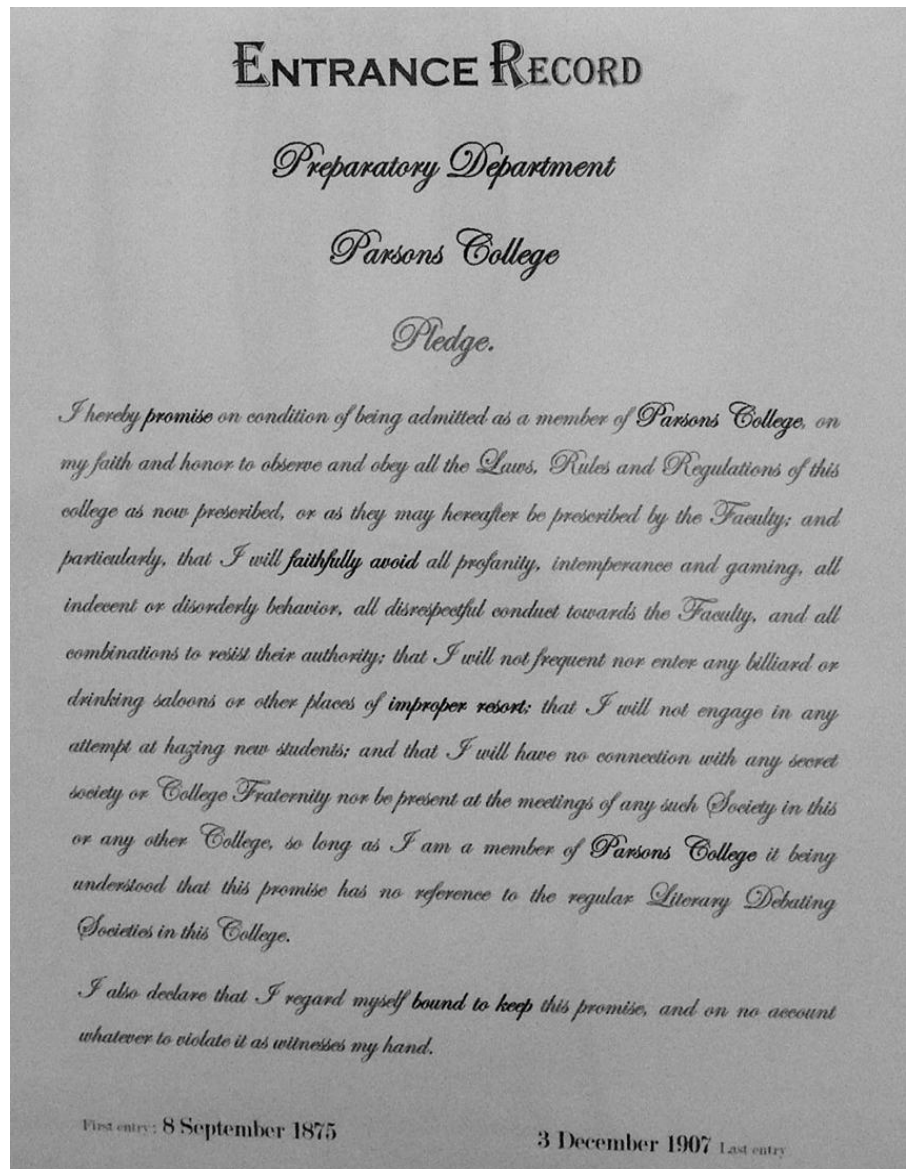

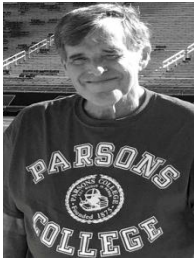
