Barhydt Stained Glass Window Panels Offered to Alumni

Treasured Stained Glass Pieces From The Early 1900's Must Be Liquidated By October 1, 2019

We said it was going to happen and it will!! You will now be able to purchase a piece of Barhydt Chapel history. The Parsons College Foundation Fund, headed by **Dave Neff**, has paved the way for the treasured stained glass window panels to be sold. They will first be offered to Parsons alums and friends. They will then be sold outright, or through auction, with a liquidation date of October 1, 2019. The 20+ crates of the panels remaining from those cut and installed in Parsons Alumni Hall at the Fairfield Arts & Convention Center, after having been stored at Bovard Studios and a local storage center, have now been identified and inventoried. The PCFF has partnered with **Yuriy and Ludmyla Maltsev**, long time valued Bovard employees, to assist with their technical, marketing and professional savvy in liquidating these magnificent pieces.





Here are samples of two of the most interesting Barhydt panels salvaged from the historic chapel. They are already accounted for and will be mounted in Alumni Hall. The remaining window panels (26 crates in all) have been inventoried, identified and priced. They are being offered first, to Parsons Alumni and friends, and then will be auctioned and liquidated. Final completion date for liquidation is October 1, 2019... (See page 2 samples for sale)

We have high hopes for a positive response from alums and friends. Reports from the Maltsev's have revealed some very high end stained glass product in various stages of condition. The PCFF has establish values with hopes that these treasured pieces will return to life and ultimately bring history and brightness to a residential household or commercial business somewhere in the United States. Included in this issue, and INITIAL OFFERING, is a sampling of 6 panels, with description, sizes and prices. These Treasures Must Find A Permanent Home by October 1, 2019



The opportunity to own a piece of history is now available to Parsons College Alumni and Friends. The last graduating class from our college was on June 2, 1973. The Barhydt Chapel was still standing proudly on the central campus. A few years later an offer was presented by Maharishi University of Management for local Parsons Alumni and Friends to dismantle the chapel piece by piece and reconstruct it in another location in Fairfield. The dollars and horsepower were not available at that time.

Before the chapel was razed Bovard Studios of Fairfield, www.bovardstudioinc.com offered to preserve the stained glass windows from the chapel. They inventoried and crated all of the windows and placed them in storage at their warehouse located one mile east of Fairfield on Highway 34. In the fall of 2017, **Ron Bovard** contacted the Parsons College Foundation Fund and asked, that due to warehouse space shortage, we move the crates to a local storage facility. Available space was found at Norm's Storage on the Glasgow Road and the crates were moved at the end of 2017. The windows are not framed and must be handled gently.

Last November two long term Bovard employees, were hired to inventory, provide descriptions, and to photograph the over 100 windows. Valuations were placed on the windows and they are now being made available to Parsons Alumni and Friends. Photographs will also be posted on the Parsons College Alumni Website www.parsonscollegealumni.com for viewing on or around August 1, 2019. Those interested can contact Dave Neff at neffacres@lisco.com, or by phone at 641-919-4640 to secure a window. He will send you a "Window Request Form" to complete and return ASAP. You will be contacted as to the "first come/first served" order of your selection. During the month of August those windows sold will be packaged and shipped (see below).

Procedure – Purchases will be made by check only, written to the **Carnegie Museum Foundation** for the selected window(s) purchased. An additional expense will be incurred for the packing and shipping. However, you may pick up your window in person, in Fairfield by appointment. A service will be for available for cleaning, packing and shipping of your windows at your expense. Should you wish additional services to upgrade or enhance you window selection, that service would be available on a contractual basis.

All windows remaining as of September 1, 2019 will then be sold to a major stained-glass reseller. The goal is to have all of the windows in their new homes or liquidated by the first of October, 2019...

He has stepped up to assist Mark with museum events, research, activities and creative development. Stan is also leading the charge to have 'Fairfield's Path to Freedom' added to the National Network to Freedom membership and directory listing, which would benefit in signing, funding and national exposure for tourism.

Those of you who attended Parsons College or lived in Fairfield from 1961-1973 know and remember all of the activity on the Parsons campus. Dr. Millard G. **Roberts** plan was to create an experience that would keep students coming back each year for more of the great student life, which was created on campus.

ENTERTAINMENT – Events were planned through the year, beginning with Homecoming in the fall, Miss Mistletoe in December, and in the Spring we enjoyed Spring Fling, Derby Day (Theta Chi sponsored), Greek Week, gala Fet, Peira (yearbook) Queen Contest, and Afro-American Week. Many of these events would pull in nationally renouned entertainers for students as well as the community to enjoy. **Bo** Diddley, Louis Armstrong, Neil Diamond, Gladys **Knight and the Pips** were just a few of the many entertainers who visited the Parsons campus.

VARSITY SPORTS – Football, Basketball (men and women), Baseball, Softball, Tennis, Golf, Track and Field. The Parsons Wildcats football team earned a trip to the Pecan Bowl in Texas and played North Dakota State. The basketball team played a home and away with Gonzaga State (nationally ranked NCAA team) and had made regular appearances at the NAIA tourney in prior years at Kansas City. The baseball team did spring training in Florida and produced a number of professional ballplayers.

INTRAMURAL SPORTS – For the sports enthusiasts there was Flag Football, Basketball, Softball, Volleyball, Tennis, Bowling, Horseshoes, Archery, Bowling, and Track and Field. Each year a Intramural Sweepstakes Competition would take place and points earned by the various organizations would be tallied for the team and individual placings in each individual sport, as well as participation points, which was intended to get more students involved in the sports activities.

SOCIAL LIFE – There were 12 National Fraternities, four National Sororities and six Independent Social Clubs. Every weekend there were campus or local bands playing at the parties on and off campus. The Den and the Town & Country Tavern were popular hangouts. North of town off Highway 1 was the popular Lake Darling for a day in the sun. And south of town there was the beautiful Keosaugua State Park and the beach along the Des Moines River.

Parsons College Legacies

As alumnus of Parsons College, one of many colleges that have closed their doors, many of us regret that our offspring and other members of our families have been denied the opportunity to attend the college that made such an impact on our lives. Failing that, it seems proper and fitting to recognize and celebrate the accomplishments of the progeny and relatives of Parsons College students and faculty members who although denied attendance at Parsons went on to achieve great things. This is the first in what is planned to be a series of articles about the legacies of Parsons College.



Hill Harper

Frances Eugene "Hill" Harper: Actor, Author, Activist

Hill Harper is the grandson of one of Iowa's most prominent Iowa families. His grandfather, Harry D. Harper, MD, practiced medicine in Fort Madison for more than fifty years. A graduate of the University of Iowa and Howard Medical School, Dr. Harper was unable to attend Iowa Medical School because Blacks were not allowed at that time to participate in obstetrics rotations. Dr. Harper was prominent in civil rights activities in Iowa and served as Chairman of the Iowa Civil Rights Commission and as President of the Fort Madison NAACP. He also participated in community activities such as the Chamber of Commerce and Kiwanis. Dr. Harper


and his wife Lillie had five children. Their three daughters went on to become highly successful in their chosen fields and were involved in civil rights efforts and other civic issues such as prison reform and education.

Their two sons, Harry Jr. and Frank, became physicians. Harry Jr., Hill's father, attended college in Pennsylvania. However, Frank attended Parsons and graduated in 1959. While at Parsons Frank was Captain of the basketball team. He also served as an assistant for Dr. VanOhlen of the Biology Department. I can still recall how Dr. VanOhlen would tell me with great pride stories about having Frank as a student and working with him as a tutor and lab assistant. After completing their medical degrees at Howard University in Washington, D.C., both returned to Iowa where Frank practiced with his dad and eventually went to California where he died in 1991.

Harry Jr. completed his residency in psychiatry at the University of Iowa Hospital and became the first Medical Director of the Lee County Mental Health Center. His wife, **Marilyn Hill**, **MD**, was one of the first African American females practicing anesthesiology.

Their son, Francis Eugene Harper (Hill Harper), was born in Iowa City in 1966. Hill began acting at age 7 and continued to do so after high school. He graduated magna cum laude from Brown University and Harvard Law School. He also earned a Master of Public Administration from the John F. Kennedy School at Harvard University. He and President Barrack Obama were classmates while they attended law school and often played basketball together.

Hill went to Los Angeles in 1993 to pursue an acting career and changed his name to "Hill" in order to honor both his maternal and paternal families. His first roles were on the Fox network series "Married with Children" and a short film "Confessions of a Dog." He went on to appear in Spike Lee's "Get on the Bus" (1996) and "He's Got Game" (1998). Harper then starred in the CBS drama "CSI:NY" where he was cast for nine seasons as coroner/crime scene investigator, Sheldon Hawks, after which he joined the cast of "Covert Affairs."

Since 2017, he played **Dr**. **Marcus Andres** on the critically acclaimed ABC series "The Good Doctor." Hill is also an award-winning author and social activist. His book, ;Letters to a Young Brother;, was the winner of the 2007 Best Book for Young Adults by the American Library Association.

Remembering the Wildcats Baseball Coaches... By Dave Neff

Parsons College Baseball Coaches played an important part in building a legacy in the memories of athletes and students at the college. During the 1960's all of the Parsons athletic programs were brought to the forefront by the drive of the college administration to gain publicity and nationwide recognition for the college. Very few coaches have had the opportunity to be recognized by having a major university ball field named in their honor. One of those coaches was our Parsons College Baseball Coach, Duane Banks.



Coach Banks, 1966-69

Duane Banks, is a native of Grand Junction, Colorado. He attended Mesa Junior College and the University of Northern Colorado where he earned all-league an all-district honors in baseball. In 1964 he played in the Atlanta Braves organization for one-year. Banks came to Parsons College beginning with the 1966 season, served as head coach for three years and accumulated a 91-10 record. He then moved to Iowa City as head coach at the University of Iowa from 1970-1997. In 1981, he set a school season record of 44 wins. Over his career, he became the winningest baseball coach at the University of Iowa with a record of 810-575-4. Banks had 21 consecutive winning seasons, three NCAA post season tournament appearances and took his team to the 1972 College World Series. Coach Banks accumulated three Big 10 Championships, produced six All-Americans, had 31 All Big 10 Selections and 57 players who signed

professional baseball contracts. He was Big Ten "Coach of the Year" in 1990 and President of the American Baseball Coaches association in 1989. Banks was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1992. In 2001, the University of Iowa baseball field was dedicated in his honor and named Duane Banks Field. Additional accomplishments included taking the 1985 U.S. Baseball Association Iowa team to Holland and Mexico. In 1982 the team played all over the world including China. Banks served on the NCAA Division I Coaching Committee, the ABAC Board of Directors and was president in 1989. You could count on one hand the number of coaches, who have had the thrill of playing professional baseball, coaching professional baseball, and managing professional baseball league in Japan.


Joe Lutz, a native of Keokuk, Iowa, became the head coach for the Wildcats team in the spring of 1964. Years earlier, in 1941, he was signed professionally by the MLB Boston Braves. During WW II he served with the Marine Corps in the South Pacific Theater and upon returning from the war, played minor league baseball beginning in 1946. His career moved forward over the years and he made his major league debut on April 17, 1951 with the St. Louis Browns. It was a short-lived career with the Browns as his last game was on May 6, 1951. Lutz was traded to the Brooklyn Dodgers. Overall, he played a total of 14 MLB games and went 6 for 36 at the plate. His coaching career began at Argyle High School in Iowa and moved on to Davenport where he led the team to a state championship. He then came to Parsons College for a one-year stint as Athletic Director and Head Baseball Coach. Early in his career he

was affiliated with the Chicago White Sox and legendary owner, Bill Veeck. He brought some of Veeck's exciting "flourish" ideas to Fairfield, like "bat girls" and skydiving onto the pitcher's mound. Lutz left Fairfield to become the head coach at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. While at the helm, he led the team to the NCAA College World Series in 1968. His SIU team lost their final game to the University of Southern California and finished with a 34-12 record. Lutz was named National Coach of the Year in 1968 by the American Association of College Coaches. The following year he led the Number 1 ranked Salukis to a 36-7 season record and again played in the 1969 College World Series. During his four-season tenure at Carbondale his record was 149-48.

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In 1971 he began a three years stint with the Cleveland Indians where he was first base coach. He previously worked in their minor league system. In 1974 he moved to Japan as a batting instructor. In 1975 Lutz became the first foreigner to manage a team, the Hiroshima Carp, in the Japanese Baseball League. Hall of Fame Pitcher Warren Spahn was hired by the Hiroshima team as pitching coach. Lutz made a number of changes. He changed the colors of the team hats to red, to reflect the teams fighting spirit. He left the team suddenly after 15 games due to an umpiring dispute. The Carp then continued on to win their first ever championship. In 1969 he moved to Sarasota, Florida to rejoin the Cleveland Indians organization, and for 12-years was the Executive Director of the Boys Club in Sarasota. Joe Lutz died in 2008 at the age of 83 of declining health, stroke and diabetes.

In the early 1960's two baseball coaches, both Parsons graduates, led the Wildcats program to prominence.



Coach Wahrer, 1962

Dr. John Wahrer, a native of Argyle, Iowa, was the head mentor for the team. He had played baseball for the Wildcats during his college career, and, after graduation, became a member of the Physical Education Faculty. He served as the baseball coach during the 1960's. Legendary basketball coach, **O.B. Nelson**, a native of Batavia, Iowa, and also a graduate of Parsons, stepped in to take over temporarily for Wahrer, as baseball coach, following his departure and until the spring of 1966.



Coach Hall, 1966

Dr. Jim Hall, coached the Wildcats Baseball team for one year. His 1966 team performed quite well, but the college yearbook was a reduced size edition and there are no statistics available for his one year as head coach. The Wildcat Baseball program produced more major league caliber players than any other sport at Parsons College. Including (years in majors), Rich Folkers (7), Tom Heintzelman (4), Don Mason (8), Dick Mills (1), Jim Todd (6) and Charlie Williams (8). Parsons players posted a total of 34 years at the top level of professional baseball.



Coach Blixt, 1970-73

Larry Blixt, stepped into the head position after Duane Banks moved 60 miles north to Iowa City as head coach of the University of Iowa Hawkeye Baseball program. Larry was raised in Galesburg, Illinois and came to Parsons on a scholarship, playing varsity football and baseball during his four years of college. He played for Wahrer, Nelson, Lutz and Banks. Larry kept the program in a winning mode during his three years as head coach. The Wildcats carried a full schedule of home and away games during his tenure. The Peira yearbook lists the 1969 season's record at 21-11, with 6 shutouts. The 1970 season record was 24-6 including 12 shutouts.



PARSON FAMILY IMPACT ON THE CIVIL WAR REVEALED...

Do you remember??? (I find it difficult to remember what I did yesterday!!!) In any of your American history classes at Parsons, do you recall any mention or discussion, related to the amazing contributions that our founder, **Lewis Baldwin Parsons**, and his brother, **Charles Algernon Parsons**, made to the success of the northern army's victory in the civil war? Well, neither do I!

It is so ironic that as Parsons students we knew nothing of what a compelling impact and the contributions these men made for their country. Well, we've uncovered a source. What should be of significant interest to Parsons College students/graduates is a soon to be released fascinating book titled, "The Life And Times of Missouri's Charles Parsons." This book is expertly authored by historian John M. Launis.

It reveals the life of Charles Parsons, and in part, that of our founder, Lewis Baldwin Parsons. Launis does an outstanding job of providing readers with an elaborate, detailed understanding of the genesis of Charles. His contributions to the field of arts, education and philanthropies were more than noteworthy. It is a wonderful opportunity to understand the man and his amazing zest for life and his involvement with Parsons College, particularly in the college's formative years, as one of Lewis' major beneficiaries.

In a fascinating disclosure, Launis reveals that Lewis had been a personal friend of **Abraham Lincoln**, dating back to the days when Lincoln was riding the campaign circuit in Southern Illinois prior to becoming president. Their friendship would foster a number of significant future events.

Upon Lincoln's recommendation, Secretary of War, **Edwin McMasters Stanton**, urged Lewis to accept the position of Superintendent of Army Rail & River Transportation Department for the northern army. Quartermaster Lewis and brother Charles performed brilliantly in their responsibilities of moving men, armament, horses, and munitions. Particularly significant were their contributions to the staging of the battles of Vicksburg and **General William Tecumseh Sherman's** "March to the Sea" through Atlanta.

Sherman's campaign success was totally dependent on the resourcefulness, genius and preparation by these men. To accomplish his mission, Sherman was preparing 100,000 men at Nashville to begin his march through Georgia. It was Lewis and Charles who were called upon to supply this massive Army. Needless to say, they answered with flying colors. Sherman was so impressed with the outcome and their delivery that he sought out Lewis and Charles to personally thank them for the "precision and efficiency displayed."

Interesting to note that Sherman, following the war, enjoyed a very close relationship with Charles and his family. Sherman would later serve as pallbearer at Charles funeral. Near the end of the war, Lincoln, Grant and Sherman were in agreement that Lewis and Charles were critical to the success of the northern army's victory over the south.

So very often there is but a minimal understanding of the significance of a quartermaster's responsibilities during time of war. It is relevant to understand the complexity and genius necessary to perform such extraordinary feats. Lewis and Charles rose to the occasion and performed distinctively. The Parsons brothers earned the respect of their superiors. Copies of letters from Lincoln, Grant, Sheridan, and Secretary of Defense Stanton lauding their brilliant performance is unequivocal proof of their respect, and admiration for these men. Stanton was quoted as saying, "Quartermaster General Lewis and Colonel Charles Parsons were without parallel in the history of moving men and armament. It is noteworthy that without their involvement and leadership the South may have emerged victorious!"

And now Parsons College friends and graduates, you know: "The rest of the story!!"

SMALL COLLEGE CRISIS...

There is an epidemic in this country concerning small liberal arts college closings as a result of diminishing enrollment. Community colleges, and state universities have become the predominant choice of high school graduates for monetary and curriculum considerations.

Case in point our "neighbor" Iowa Wesleyan University recently reached a critical mass faced with dwindling enrollment. It is fair to say that given current trends, that a Parsons College today, would very likely have been faced with similar circumstances.



Fortunately an alternative to Iowa Wesleyan's prospective closing was a recent announcement that they have merged with St. Leo University located in St. Leo, Florida. The merger is expected to facilitate a stronger financial position allowing Iowa Wesleyan to redefine their curriculum to become more attractive to prospective students.

Our closing in 1973 was defined as mismanagement, causing a financial crisis that led to the demise. Isn't it ironic that had we survived, our college might very well have been faced with another major financial crisis, the result of the fore mentioned current dynamics. OR... would it be a fair assumption to believe that Parsons would have made the necessary adjustments, and its network risen to such stature and size, it would have avoided this dilemma. We'll never know, will we????

The Alumni Write

George "Ish" Tucker, PC'68 writes...Interesting stories abound, so I may as well throw mine into the mix. Last February I experienced Sudden Cardiac Arrest Ventricle Tacyycardia. I was traveling at 80 mph on I-75 in Florida with my wife Linda. Passed out at the wheel after bringing car to a halt in the center lane. Linda screamed at me and woke me. I then drove to the shoulder and passed out again. She called 911 and was instructed to perform CPR. She brought me back from the abyss with a heartbeat again. I woke up six hours later in the emergency room. I'm now in great shape, no memory or motor control loss. All is well with implanted Pacemaker/Defibulator. The benefits: lost 22 pounds, no booze (ugh) and an RV to get some of our bucket list items expedited. Of course I have my Guardian Angel, wife Linda, as my co-pilot on board with me...

David Thompson, PC'70 writes... A FLIGHT FOR THE AGES... AND THEN SOME!!!



I joined four other pilots for the trip of a lifetime. My friends and I flew a fully restored 1937 DC3 from Portland, Oregon to London, then onto an emotional D-Day landing in Normandy on June 5th, the 75th Anniversary date of the Allies invasion of France. We departed Portland in a plane owned and restored by a local friend and businessman who was also part of the flight crew. We followed the same northern route, over Canada, Greenland to Iceland prior to crossing the North Atlantic and flying to Scotland and into London just as the World War II pilots did. Our flight crew had a combined total of over 40,000 hours compared to the WWII crews, which in most cases had less than 200 hour flying experience per

man. Plus today we had the advantage of new engines, props, landing gear and all the GPS navigation systems and the comfort of a G-5 Gulfstream. In addition to our pilots, there were six others on board. It took us about five days to make it to London where we joined 200 other Aircraft and flew in formation into Normandy on June 5th. Our average speed was about 155mph and we cruised at an altitude range of 5000 – 7000 feet. We were greeted along the way when we stopped by local dignitaries, such as the city mayors and councilmen in Presque Isle, Maine. At Goose Bay, Newfoundland we refueled and spent the night. After departing for Iceland the next morning we discovered a significant oil leak from the right engine. We returned to Greenland and one of our expert mechanics determined that there was no leak. It was the result of our overfilling the engines and it being kicked back out. So, we spent an unexpected night in Greenland with poor facilities and subpar food.

However, our spirits remained high as we headed for Iceland. We spent two nights in Iceland, then it was off to Inverness, Scotland and onto Duxford, England, the staging area for our formation flight to Normandy. Although ENews has not received final confirmation, there is little doubt this contingency of 27 DC3's, half from the U.S., left England at 3:45pm on June 5, on the 1.5 hours flight to Normandy. No doubt they flew 100



feet apart and that there were an estimated 200 parachuters onboard, dressed in combat gear, and equipped with WWII parachutes. President Trump requested that they fly low over the American Cemetery in Normandy in honor of the 5000 troops who lost their lives on D-Day and we suspect they did. The crowds were so large they closed the roads surrounding Normandy. Dignitaries, from all over the world were on hand. It was believed to have been one extremely memorable and beautiful sight. The crew ultimately landed in Caen, France, their final stop. Since the DC3 was equipped with a camera they were hoping for some marvelous pictures. With major confidence, ENews concludes, this 6 ½ day trip had to be everything the crew expected and more! (Continued on page 12)






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Philip Justice Taylor
